History of Table Shuffleboard

Part 2

Table shuffleboard was undoubtedly brought to North America during the Colonial era, but the first record of the game is from an 1848 court case in Pennsylvania, where a tavern owner was charged with keeping a public gaming table. The case was dismissed because the judge ruled that shuffleboard was a game of skill, not of chance. During the late 19th century, shuffleboard became something of a fad among wealthy New Yorkers; many of them

bought custom made tables from famous furniture makers such as Duncan Phyfe. At the same time, table shuffleboard was becoming popular in taverns and pool parlors, first in the New York City area, then in New Jersey, Philadelphia, Chicago, and points west. Like pocket billiards, table shuffleboard went through a series of ups and downs during the 20th century. The sport declined during prohibition, then made a mild comeback on the East Coast during the late 1930s.

The History of Mother's Day

Although there are others who claim to have started Mother's Day. It was Frank E. Hering, a Past Grand Worthy President of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, that made the first known public plea for a national day to honor our mothers.

And it was Frank E. Hering who in 1925 was invited by the "Society of War Mothers" to participate in a special Mother's Day ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery. There, at the "Tomb of the Unknown Soldier", before a tremendous audience that included many congressmen and senators, Hering was introduced as "the Father of Mother's Day."

But that was over 21 years after Hering's first public plea, and 11 years after President Wilson, by national Proclamation, officially made Mother's Day the second Sunday in May. And many things happened during that span of time. A lot of hard work, a lot of other people trying to take the credit, and even an article by Hering himself titled....."NOW WE FIGHT!" That was the headline over the Mother's Day editorial in a decades-ago issue of Eagle Magazine.

Apple Vodka by Aux Member Theresa H.

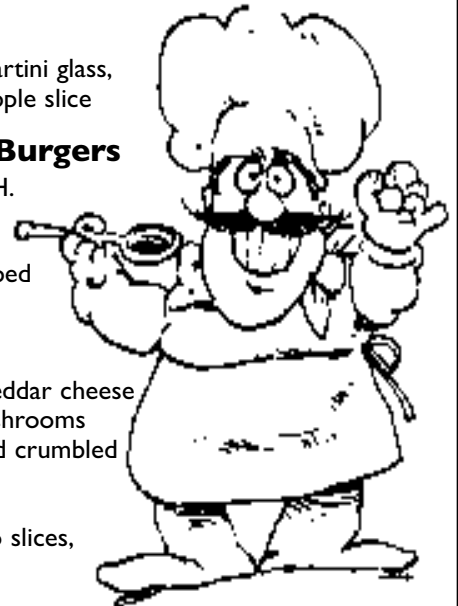
Splash of Sour Mix

Scrum-Delicious Burgers

1-1/2lb ground beef
3 tablespoons finely chopped onion
1/2 tsp garlic salt
1/2 tsp pepper
1 cup (4 oz) shredded cheddar cheese
1/3 cup canned sliced mushrooms
6 bacon strips, cooked and crumbled
1/4 cup mayonnaise
6 hamburger buns, split
Lettuce leaves and tomato slices, optional



In a medium bowl, combine beef, onion, garlic salt and pepper; mix well. Shape into six patties, 3/4 in. thick. In a small bowl, combine the cheese, mushrooms, bacon and mayonnaise; refrigerate. Grill burgers over medium-hot coals for 10-12 minutes, turning once. During the last 3 minutes, spoon 1/4 cup of the cheese mixture onto each burger. Serve on buns with lettuce and tomato if desired. Yield: 6 servings.

FOE Memorial Foundation: "The greatest change in the Eagles in the last 50 years..."

"Our Memorial Foundation now covers every member of the F.O.E."

So said John Sullivan, past state president from California, after delegates to the 103rd Grand Aerie Convention in Louisville approved a resolution and a change in the F.O.E. statutes extending the coverage of the Eagles Memorial Foundation to every single member in good standing of our Order.

John headed the committee that put in countless hours of research, study and actuary discussions on the matter before recommending approval of the historic change. Started July 1, 1947, the Eagles Memorial Foundation has ever since offered health and education aids to the school-age children of Eagles who lost their lives in the armed services of their country. Over the years, its coverage was expanded to include children of Eagles who lost their lives in the line of duty as policemen and firemen (professional and volunteer), prison guards, emergency medical technicians, chaplains riding with emergency vehicles, as well as to graduates of Home On The Range, Sky High Ranch and Bob Hope High School.

Through May 31, 2001, a total of \$3,057,850.29 in medical, dental and educational aid has been disbursed by the Foundation. Just in the 2000-01 fraternal year, \$103,133.72 was paid out to the children of Eagle heroes. The education grant allowance alone is now up to \$6,000 per year, with a maximum of \$30,000 available for all years.

Is it any wonder, then, that the Memorial Foundation has been looked on as perhaps the most humane of all Eagle People-Helping-People programs? With the change approved by acclamation in Louisville, our Memorial Foundation benefits are today available to the children of every Eagle member in good standing, Aerie and Auxiliary, who loses his/her life from injuries or disease incurred or aggravated in the performance of their daily employment.

"With this change," said the resolution originating at Burlington, Washington Aerie 3242, and then approved at the Washington State Aerie convention before going before the delegates to the international convention in Kentucky, "the Fraternal Order of Eagles will stimulate growth by attracting younger future members, which is necessary for the longevity and posterity of the Order."

A statement by Grand Worthy President Ed Bollenbacher and Chairman of the Board W.P. "Pete" Harty called it "another progressive step in moving forward with our mission of making this fraternal order the best-known group in the world. This type of benefit should be used as a tool to recruit new members that will enliven and enlighten our Order for many years to come. We can proudly say 'We take care of our own and work to assist those who cannot take care of themselves.'"

Ed and Pete urge every member to spread the word about the coverage of all Eagles in good standing by our Memorial Foundation. "Talk to those who are not members about our benefits and privileges as members of the Fraternal Order of Eagles."
